Pre-FCTC

Solid evidence base, but no international benchmarks

 TC efforts at <u>national and subnational</u> levels vs a <u>transnational</u> epidemic

... 8 years since entry into force




8 years later, we're winning!


- Hard fought battles, some more wins
 - Smoke-free environments (Art 8)
 - Pictorial health warnings (Art 11)
 - TAPS bans and plain packaging (Art 13)
 - Higher taxes to reduce consumption (Art 6)
 - Protection from TI interference (Art 5.3)
 - Comprehensive TC laws

8 years later, are we really winning?

67,541,437

people have died from tobacco-caused diseases since the opening of the first FCTC working group on 28 October 1999 (as of 9:00am, 21 Aug 2013)*.

The death clock is still ticking *very fast*.

If the FCTC is working...(1)

Q: Why is TI still causing 6 million deaths annually?

- Demand reduction is <u>not working</u> fast enough
- Still many non-existent or sub-FCTC TC laws
- TI screaming against effective laws, suing governments

If the FCTC is working...(2)

Q: Why is TI expanding and continuing to profit?

- Supply reduction is not yet happening
 - Illicit trade (Art 15)
 - Sales to and by minors (Art 16)
 - Alternative livelihoods (Art 17)





Obstacles: usual suspects

- Traditional approaches to health
 - TC and FCTC belong under MOH mandate
- Lack of political leadership
 - TC not a priority, even in MOH
- TI is a "legal" industry making/selling "legal" products (hopefully a temporary status)
 - Undue advantage, gaining/building allies
 - Govt/politics: legislators; trade, agriculture, finance
 - Front groups and CSR
 - International trade (FTAs and BITs, illicit trade protocol)
 - New threat: Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) agreement

Persistence pays

Transformation: local to global (177 Parties)

- 100% smokefree world
- Large pictorial warnings
- Total TAPS ban and plain packaging
- Uniformly high excise taxes
- Education and social media: maximum reach
- How: denormalize the tobacco industry



Denormalizing TI: key strategy

- Stop TI interference and influence
 - Demand and supply reduction: health, education, trade, tax, customs, labor, agriculture
 - End TI partnerships: CSR, stakeholder tactics


Q: How well does the public know?

- The TI has not reformed; still a killer, racketeer, and peddler of addiction preying on youth and poor






Convincing non-advocates

2 sides of the same coin

FCTC

implementation: whole of government



- Build on past collaborative TC successes
- Build non-health champions: political and social influence



Educating TC advocates

- Seeing from a non-advocate perspective: speaking the same language
- Get out of our comfort zone
- Do we know enough to <u>very</u> tightly regulate the industry?
 - Farming and leaf processing
 - Manufacturing
 - Tax, trade (legal/illegal)



1 + 1 = 3

- Systematic collaboration is crucial for catalysis
- Complementary/synergistic roles
- Goal: collective success



- Civil society advocates
- Researchers
- Funders

Current opportunities

- NCDs and post-2015 MDGs
 - Caution: tobacco should be explicit, not implied
- Plain packaging
- Illicit Trade Protocol
 - TI is many steps ahead of TC
